## SEMI-ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT - SIX MONTHS TO 30th JUNE 2020

**Overall deficit** is €3,450 compared to a surplus of €2,271 in 2019 - see below for reasons.

Naturally, the Covid-19 restrictions are impacting income, expenses and events

**Net income** from subscriptions is €626 or 18% lower than the same period last year, partly because of the lower rate single person sub as well as reducing membership

The increased costs of €1,653 (35%) in administration expenses derives mainly from Address Book costs being €605 more and general office and website costs being €677 up

**Total other income** at €4,516 is only €442 lower than 2019 and includes sponsorship close to the same period last year. It is anticipated that because of Covid-19 function income will be greatly reduced this year.

**Welfare costs** have so far totalled €4,474 - €3,000 ahead of this stage in 2019 reflecting the sudden and non-foreseeable nature of this type of expense and a conscious effort to help where appropriate in these troublesome times. Our Welfare team, Pauline Holloway and Chris Gaskell, continue to work on a series of cases some of which might require significant funding in the future, as well as the invaluable help and advice that they always provide for all kinds of members' problems.

We have the **Vendange Lunch** in September and various other social events provisionally planned in the last few months of 2020. Because we do not know what additional calls may be made on our Welfare funds, it is vital that we continue to receive where appropriate your support, help and contributions for all this year's remaining activities.

## Necklace thefts

Meanwhile, they take the opportunity to gently steal the woman's necklace. The victims feel nothing. It is only afterwards that they realize the harm they have suffered.

Yet another scam to bear in mind, especially if you wear gold necklaces in public!

  
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## Chairman's Report

It has been a difficult year for the planning of the year by the Committee although the Welfare activities continue as usual. In March we had serious concerns about Covid 19 as it appeared that this was to be a long term issue. Despite the situation showing distinct improvement after the confinement, as at early August the Coronavirus situation in France is far from stable as the number of cases has been rising rapidly, particularly here on the coast. I had been sending out the Committee Circulars in order to advise on the latest regulations and more particularly stressing that precautions that needed to be taken.

The regulations have become increasingly complicated in that the regulations have, in many cases, been devolved to the local Prefecture or even the Mairie so, for example, there are now many towns in the Var, primarily on the south coast, where masks are obligatory at all times. It is probably best therefore to carry a mask at all times and to use it unless eating in the restaurant (a mask is even required when walking through a restaurant or going to the toilet).



The British Government has now imposed a 14 day quarantine on all persons travelling through or from France. Please therefore be very prudent about travel arrangements as

even a short trip to the UK would require quarantine. Please also check your travel insurance in that if you are travelling against Government advice your insurance may be void.

Concerning precautions to be taken, these still remain: maintaining distance, hand washing, use of gel and use of masks. The importance of taking these precautions cannot be understated. This being the case we are taking particular care in arranging the Vendange Lunch and we have had to reduce capacity at the event. Nevertheless it will be a very enjoyable event and an opportunity to relax a little at this difficult time. We still remain cautious about holding future events and with no vaccine being available we may have to yet again have to hold a virtual AGM. On verra!

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## Heated bar terraces to go

Heated terraces at French bars and restaurants will be outlawed starting next year, as part of a package of measures aimed at reducing carbon emissions unveiled by the government. While a handful of French cities have already banned heated terraces, Paris Mayor Anne Hidalgo has refused, saying businesses stand to lose a huge chunk of their revenues. "People now understand that we are at risk and that, if we don't do anything, we'll have an ecological crisis after this health crisis," Macron's new Environment Minister Barbara Pompili told French daily Le Monde.

Among other measures to be introduced by decree in the coming months, building owners will be encouraged to improve insulation, and will be prohibited from installing coal or fuel oil furnaces. New limits on development will also be rolled out to limit the "concreting" of natural areas, though the government held back on an outright ban of new shopping malls outside cities, long demanded by green activists. The measures, which came after a meeting of Macron's environmental defence council of top ministers, got a lukewarm response from environmental groups. Clement Senechal of Greenpeace France said they "push back any real change until 2023, after the end of Macron's term."

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## Gas and electricity prices rose in August

From 1 August, gas prices rose by 1.3% for those who use gas for cooking, 0.7% for cooking and hot water and 1.4% for heating. Electricity prices rose by 1.54%.

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## Parking meter scam – follow –up

After the report last month about a parking meter scam being operated in Marseilles, this has now spread to Draguignan so beware!

## Fly Tipping App

Residents in France are invited to download and use a new app that aims to combat fly tipping and the illegal dumping of waste in nature and beauty spots. Environmental group l'Association France Nature Environnement has launched a new app called "Sentinelles de la Nature ('Nature Guardians')", which will allow residents to alert the group to illegally-dumped waste in natural areas and see where in France is most affected. The association has been gathering data on the most polluted sites in the country, shown on the app via a colour-coded map. Each time someone reports waste dumping on the app, they are invited to take photos and describe what they saw. Their report may then prompt the association to come to their aid and fix the problem. In extreme cases, the association is ready to invoke the law. Each year it brings 20-30 cases to court in relation to illegal waste.

Illegal fly-tipping in nature and beauty spots is a growing problem all over France, prompting the government to launch a range of measures in 2018 to tackle the estimated 80,000 tonnes of excess waste that is dumped in the countryside every year. Fly tipping is illegal, and can be punished by a fine of between €68 and €1,500 - but this is often not enforced.

## Azur Photography Group

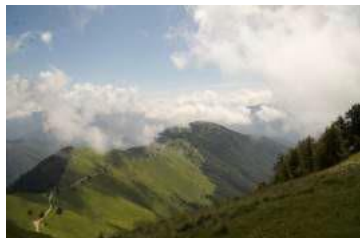


This challenge of "Black on Black" proved to be as difficult as it sounded.....

### Fayence Aqueduct

As part of the Roman Empire, the Côte d'Azur and its inland areas were provided with excellent infrastructure, including roads, bridges, and even aqueducts, because not only did the Romans love their baths, but they also required sufficient water for their fields and the operation of grist mills. The aqueduct of Fayence was needed to process grains. The water was brought in along an artificial route from the foothills of the southern Alps to power the mill. Years later, however, Roman architecture was not held in such high regard, and planners laid a road right through the middle of the aqueduct.

The town of Fayence was first mentioned in print in the 12<sup>th</sup> century as "Favienta Loca" or "advantageous place", and shortly afterwards the bishop of Fréjus built a summer residence there. Today Fayence is a quaint old village on a hilltop harbouring a variety of restaurants, hotels and craft shops, with its steep lanes and houses leading up to the ruins of the castle and a viewing platform, where you can watch the gliders take off and land at the airfield below.

The Moulin de Camandoule, on the plain below the village, was built in 1834 on the foundations of a 15<sup>th</sup> century Roman mill and was converted in 1968 into an upmarket country hotel with



extensive grounds. While excavating for the swimming pool, builders unearthed Roman bricks and other ancient relics.

Getting there: Chemin de Notre Dame des Cyprès, 83440 Fayence. Reached via the D19 about 0.8km southwest of the village.

I hope this finds you all well and safe. I also hope that some of you have had visits from your family. I am sorry for those of you whose family are unable to visit due to quarantine. So far this year Welfare has supported 18 members and 1 non-member with various needs. These range from air conditioning problems to finding a health specialist.

I thought I'd give you some of this information as it may come in handy for you:

Specialists -your doctor may advise you of an appropriate specialist. You can choose your own specialist by using a site called Doctolib and putting your need in to the search box e.g.allergie. You can refine it more by specifying your area e.g. Draguignan. You can book an appointment on line. It will tell you when the next available appointment is with your chosen specialist. There is a lot of information on this site that may be useful.

Getting to medical appointments at hospitals/clinics - If you know you will have difficulty getting to an appointment e.g. frailty, mobility, a medical problem that makes driving difficult etc, ask your doctor if you qualify for transport to the appointment. I recommended this to a client and the doctor would issue a 'bon de transport '. You can find taxis who are signed up for this service on line. You also will have friends who want to help so please ask them. You can contact Welfare and we can help where we can or speak to a Committee member.

Remember to take care and keep safe. Masks are being worn in more and more places so carry one with you at all times and wear it when necessary. Keep a safe social distance. Wash your hands or use the hydroalcoholic gel. Drink plenty of fluids, keep cool and refresh yourself with a shower, swim or water mister.

## Pet alert

Owners of pets travelling between France and the UK are being warned to prepare for big changes after Brexit happens on the 1st of January. There's almost certain to be a four month waiting period to register cats, dogs and other domestic pets before they're allowed to travel. At the moment, rules on transporting animals are still under EU regulations but when the transition period ends things will get much more complicated. Pet owners are being advised that if they want to make a trip in January, they need to start preparing in September. Owners should contact their vet at least 4 months before a trip departure date to make sure that all the necessary paperwork can be completed in time. There could yet be a last minute deal between the UK and EU to keep pet transport regulations light but its best to be prepared as time is running out.

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## Brits in France

A recently published study from the French national statistical office provides an interesting portrait of the British who live in France. According to INSEE, based on the latest census results from 2016, 148,300 British nationals live in France, equivalent to 0.2% of the total population. They are by no means the largest group of resident Europeans, coming in only fourth, behind the Portuguese (546,100), the Italians (194,600) and the Spanish (157,400). However, of this cluster, the British are the most recent migrants to France, most of whom settled in France after 1990, since when their number has more than doubled to nearly 150,000.

The study also reports that there are 86,000 British non-resident second-home owners, meaning that in total the best part of 250,000 British nationals own property in France. Former British nationals who have acquired French nationality have not been included in the figures. The wave of migration over the past 20 years may

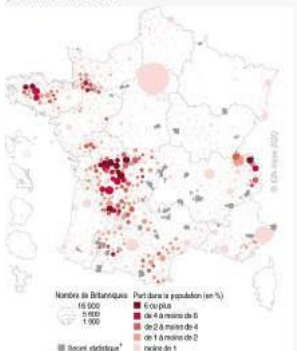
well have been mainly retired couples relocating to the rural areas of the country, but that has not always been the case. The study shows that, historically, most British migrants relocated to France for work, settling in the main metropolitan areas, principally Paris and environs. In 1990,

60% of British nationals in France lived in one of the main urban areas, whereas now only 25% do so. Nevertheless, the metropolitan area of Paris (including the Ile-de-France) continues to have the largest concentration of British nationals, where over 18,000 have their home, but down from nearly 23,000 in 1990.

Some 41% of British residents (55,000) are employed or in business, a figure a lot lower than a great deal of reported information on this point, although small pockets of those with a professional activity may not have been picked up due to the methodology used. Slightly less (39%) are retired, another 9% merely registered as 'inactive', 5% are students or pupils, and 5% are registered as unemployed.

The graphic shows the distribution of British nationals across France as a percentage of the total population. The British are concentrated mainly in a vast area stretching from the Haute-

Vienne to the Gers, including the Charente and the Dordogne, in the two regions of Nouvelle-Aquitaine (39,200) and Occitane (24,900), where 43% live. The British are also strongly present in inland Brittany, south-western Normandy, Mayenne and in Savoie and Haute-Savoie. The largest concentration of Brits as a percentage of the local population is in and around Morzine (Haute-Savoie), Le Dorat (Haute-Vienne) and Eymet (Dordogne).

### Radars in the Var

There are now 56 radars of all types in the VAR, but the 11<sup>th</sup> new-style tall radar was installed in May on the route du col de la Bigue (RD43) above Folcaqueiret where the speed is limited to 80km/h. The others are situated at Les Arcs (DN7), Saint Maximin (RD560), Sainte Maxine (deux sur RD 25), Trans-en-Provence (RD555), Brignoles (RD43), Ramatuelle (RD61), Cuers, (RD43), Hyères (RD98), and Roquebrune-sur-Argens (RN7).



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# A Guide to Food in France

## Part 2

**I is for ice** - if you want ice in your drink you need to ask for it. Unlike in the USA, where it's the norm for soft drinks to be served with ice, French waiters will not add ice to your Orangina unless you ask for it avec glaçons.

**J is for les jeunes** - Children are welcomed in pretty much all restaurants in France and French families consider it perfectly normal to take their children with them when they go out to dinner. They will be expected to sit up at the table though, French restaurants don't go in for kids play areas or having children running around the restaurant. And 'kids menus' are not particularly common in France, except in tourist areas. Children usually eat what their parents eat, just in smaller portions.

**K is for ketchup** - it goes with frites and frites only in France. Ask for ketchup with your steak, omelette or salmon and expect appalled looks.

**L is for lawyer** - Hopefully you won't need any of these to go out for dinner, but 'salad of lawyer' is a common mistranslation on English menus in France. This is because the French word for lawyer and avocado is the same - avocat.

**M is for meat** - French cuisine has a reputation as being meat heavy and certainly a lot of the traditional dishes are centred around meat, but the offering for vegetarians and vegans is slowly improving, especially in the big cities.

Just make it clear that you don't eat meat at all, as some French people use vegetarian to describe someone who doesn't eat red meat but will have chicken or pork.

**N is for noisettes** - the French for nuts - as in tarte aux noisettes - and also a type of coffee. If you like an espresso with a dash of hot milk, this is what to order.

**O is for offal** - Many classic French dishes revolve around offal and it can be surprisingly delicious. From salade de gésiers (a salad topped with slow-

cooked duck and goose innards) to the various different types of tripes (cow's stomach) on offer at French markets, they're all nicer than they sound.

**P is for pichet** - If you just ask for d'eau in a French restaurant you will probably be brought mineral water, which can be pricier than wine. If you're happy with a jug of tap water to go with your dinner, ask for un pichet d'eau or une carafe d'eau. Wine can also be bought by the pichet if



you want more than a glass but less than a bottle.

**O is for queuing** - some restaurants you have to queue for, and some are worth the wait. Several of Paris' traditional bouillon restaurants do not take reservations, but are worth the wait for very traditional French cuisine that's also extremely reasonably priced.

**R is for raclette** - Although the Swiss claim they invented this (and to be fair they almost certainly did) it's very popular in France in the winter, especially in the mountainous areas in the east. Winter in France generally brings forth several delicious ways to melt cheese for dinner from raclette to fondue to tartiflette.



**S is for steak** - it's not quite true that French chefs refuse to cook steaks 'well done' but it won't make you many friends. Meat in general is served pinker than many Anglos are used to, but it tastes better that way, so why not go with the flow and order your steak medium rare?

**T is for tea** - one for the Brits, unless you specify carefully what you want when ordering tea you are unlikely to be brought a powerful builder's brew with milk. Tea is often served with lemon in France, so you need to specify thé au lait if you want milk.

**W is for wine** - whole books have been written on this, but suffice to say it's the traditional choice to go with food and also an apéro if you're talking rosé. Don't hurl it back, in France wine is something to be sipped, tasted and enjoyed.
